PAC Packs Star Power in April

Tulsa, OK. April at the PAC packs plenty of star power with world-renowned actress Lynn Redgrave appearing in a one-woman show, CNBC's David Faber addressing Tulsa Town Hall and Academy Award-winning actor Tim Robbins' L.A. Actor's Gang presenting three performance of George Orwell's *1984*. There are 21 different events this April!

Those who love all things Irish won't want to miss **Gráda** on April 4. The young, Dublin-based band, presented by the PAC Trust, takes traditional Irish music to a new level. Tickets are \$20-\$25.

It's tax time, and the jokes on the IRS with Theatre Tulsa's comedy *Love, Sex and the IRS*, April 4-6 and 10-12. Tickets are \$17.50 for adults, \$15 for seniors, \$12 for students and \$5 for teachers and members of the military.

Tulsa Symphony Orchestra concludes its season with a wide-ranging program conducted by Carl Topilow on April 5. Gershwin's *An American in Paris* and Sarasate's *Zigeunerweisen* will be featured. Tickets are \$5-\$60.

The Actors' Gang, an L.A.-based theatre troupe co-founded by Academy Award-winning actor Tim Robbins, performs *1984*, an edgy new adaptation of George Orwell's chilling novel, directed by Robbins. Tickets are \$29 for adults and \$15 for students for the April 8-10 shows, presented by Choregus Productions. Recommended for mature audiences only.

Tulsa audiences will have the opportunity to see one of the leading actresses of our time when Golden Globe-winning actress **Lynn Redgrave** (*Georgy Girl, Shine, Gods and Monsters*) presents her one-woman show *Nightingale* on April 8. Tickets are \$30. Redgrave is brought to Tulsa by the Oklahoma Center for Poets and Writers.

CNBC's Peabody and Dupont Award-winning host **David Faber** offers a clear and articulate assessment of the thrills and spills of Wall Street and corporate America when he addresses Tulsa Town Hall on April 11. Tickets are sold by subscription; call 749-5965.

Hailed as the Mozart of India, former child prodigy Chitravina Ravikiran is the "**Master of Melharmony**" and a virtuoso player of the chitravina, a fretless sitar-like instrument. The South Asian Performing Arts Foundation presents Ravikiran April 11. Tickets are \$10-\$20.

The **Souls of Our Feet** is a fast-paced restaging of legendary tap routines performed to live jazz music and visually enhanced by film clips of the original stars. The PAC Trust presents the Tapestry Dance Company in this April 12 show. Tickets are \$25-\$30. The dancers will conduct a \$10 workshop on April 11.

Tulsa's premier classical choir, **Tulsa Oratorio Chorus**, will perform Leonard Bernstein's popular Chichester Psalms and Arthur Honegger's dramatic King David on April 12. Tickets are \$20.

Oboist Thomas Gallant will join Naumberg Award finalists **The Adaskin String Trio** for a program of music by Mozart, Schubert and Britten on April 13. Tickets are \$5-\$25 for this Chamber Music Tulsa presentation.

This month's Armchair Traveler film is *Cruising Russia: St. Petersburg to Moscow*, presented by the PAC Trust on April 14. Tickets are \$8.

Lynette Louise's one-woman play about raising eight children — including four on the autism spectrum — is full of funny, heartbreaking and triumphant stories. Tickets to *Thing to Thing to Thing* on April 19 are \$25. Disabled adults and parents of autistic children will be admitted free of charge.

Council Oak Men's Chorale bows to "royal" musical figures, with songs by the King of Rock and Roll, the Queen of Soul, Duke Ellington and Queen in a concert titled *Musical Royalty* April 25-26. Tickets are \$15.

National Pastime tells the compelling story of Jackie Robinson, the first African-American to break major league baseball's color barrier. American Theatre Company stages the play April 25-27, 30 and May 1-3. Tickets are \$20; \$17 for students and seniors.

Tulsa Opera concludes its season with Mozart's final and most beloved opera, *The Magic Flute*, on April 26 and May 2, 4. It will be sung in German with English translations projected above the stage. Tickets are \$20-\$95.

Free noontime concerts, Brown Bag It, continues in April with the **Pendleton Family Fiddlers** on April 2, **Joan Hatley and Mary Sallee** on April 9 and **Rick Fortner and Friends** on April 16. Concerts are held in the Westby Pavilion.

In the Gallery: In conjunction with Lynn Redgrave's performance, Redgrave's daughter, Annabel Clark, will exhibit a moving collection of photographs documenting her mother's battle with breast cancer. The photographs are accompanied by Redgrave's journal entries from that time. Admission is free.
